David Culp. David Culp has been lecturing nation-wide for over 15 years. He is contributing editor for Horticulture magazine and a regular author for Fine Gardening magazine. His articles have been featured in national and regional publications such as Horticulture, Martha Stewart Living, Green Scene, Country Living, Colonial Home, Fine Gardening, Chester County Living, The Philadelphia Enquirer and numerous other publications. He has appeared on television for Martha Stewart Living and HGTV. He is an instructor for both sun and shade perennials at Longwood Gardens. He has served as chairman of the PA Hardy Plant Society, 1993-1994.

Gregg Tepper. Gregg Tepper is the Woods Path Horticulturist at Mt. Cuba Center in Greenville, DE where he maintains a three-acre wooded section of over 400 different taxa of native plants. Gregg studied Horticulture at the University of Delaware and has been a native plant enthusiast for over 25 years. He has designed several native plant gardens in Delaware, Maryland, New York and Pennsylvania in addition to currently maintaining a two-acre native plant and shade garden at his home in Fair Hill, Maryland. His interests include rare and unusual forms of native plants with a focus on Ferns, Lilies, Irises, and Trilliums.

Pandora Young, Pandora Young is a Senior Gardener at Longwood Gardens, specializing in native plants. She is also a Teacher for a Certificate of Merit series course on Edible Plants at Longwood. She earned her B.A. in Japanese Studies at Earlham College in Indiana. A semester with the National Outdoor Leadership School in the Southwest United States and experiences in the mountains of Japan have created her expertise and continued interest in edible plants and foraging.

Shirley R. Wagner, Moderator, is the chair and co-creator of the Garden Symposium as well as the Coordinator of the Master Gardener Program of Lancaster County and has been a Master Gardener since 1988. She is the past chair of the Regional Master Gardener Coordinators, past member of the State Steering Committee for nine years and its secretary for four years. Shirley chaired the Master Gardener Northeast Regional Conference held in Lancaster and currently serves as the chair on the International Master Gardener Conference Committee's Nominating Committee.

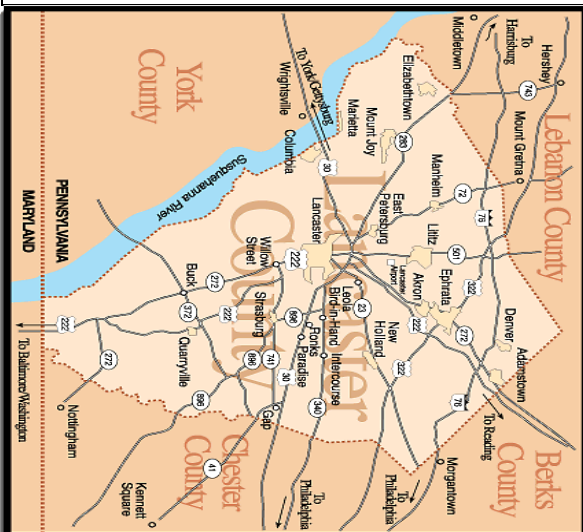

Directions from the York: Take 30 East to Lancaster exit at Litz Pike/222 South. Continue 222 South/Prince Street through Lancaster City. Willow Valley is 3 miles south of the city on the right.

From Philadelphia and Points East of Lancaster: Take 30 West to Lancaster. Exit at the Fruitville Pike/Downtown Lancaster. Turn left on the Fruitville Pike and follow until it becomes 222 South/Prince Street. Continue through Lancaster and Willow Valley is 3 miles south of the city on the right.

From Reading: Follow 222 South to 30 West. Take Fruitville Pike exit and follow the directions above (from Philadelphia).
